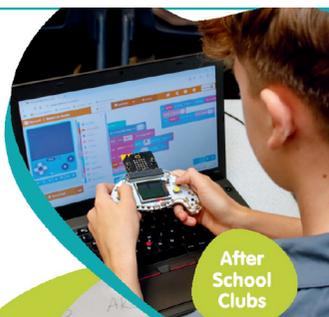

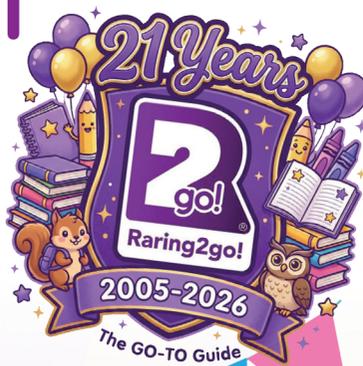

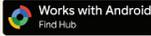

10 Top Tips for a stress free egg hunt this Easter

1 Buy plenty of eggs so each child can have their fair share, mini eggs are best. It sounds obvious but use wrapped chocolate!

2 Agree the rules to avoid tears! Are you going to colour code eggs so everyone can only collect their own ones or will you share out evenly at the end?

3 Make the hunt age appropriate; toddlers won't tolerate it taking too long.

4 Use markers pointing to where eggs may be found for little ones and maybe make a treasure hunt with clues for older children.

5 Do the egg hunt after breakfast, or lunch, so eating chocolate won't spoil their meal! Agree the rules for eating the eggs in advance.

6 Use alternatives to chocolate if you want to avoid sugar overload such as tiny toys (save up Kinder surprise cases to put them in or buy plastic egg cases) or use decorated eggs.

7 Don't make it too hard or you can be out all day. Make sure everyone knows the ground rules like everything is hidden in the back garden and there is no need to climb to find the eggs.

8 Count the eggs before you put them out so you know how many need retrieving!

9 Remember baskets, or bowls, for everyone to collect the eggs in. It can be a craft project in the days before to decorate them.

10 If the weather looks bad have a Plan B for indoors- it can be just as much fun!

How to build a mini wildlife pond

wildlife watch



You will need:

- an old bucket or watertight container 
- spade 
- sand 
- old bricks, rocks and pebbles 
- native pondweed (eg. curled pondweed) 

- 1 Dig a hole deep enough to hold your container.
- 2 Remove any sharp rocks and line bottom with sand.
- 3 Sit the container in the hole and fill the gaps with loose soil.
- 4 Build a pile of rocks and bricks in bottom, scatter pebbles and add pondweed. Fill with rainwater.

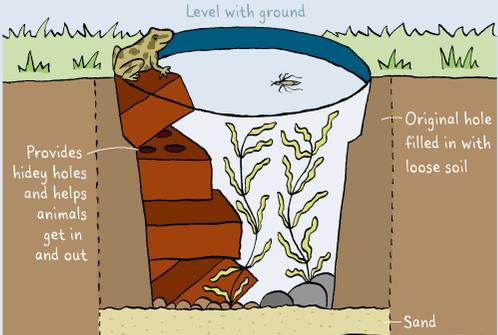

12 Top SATS TIPS for Parents



1. Give your child a special study area, somewhere quiet, well lit & warm.
2. Stop your child working at least an hour before bed.
3. Make sure they get plenty of sleep, fresh air & exercise.
4. Check they drink plenty of water & eat well.
5. Keep it calm & low key – if you are calm & relaxed your child will be.
6. “I can!” Think & talk positively - encourage them to be confident. Listen to their worries and fears – offer plenty of reassurance & hugs.
7. Practice makes perfect - past papers are available free on-line.
8. If you find your child is struggling ask for help.
9. Make it real & fun – practice mental maths during your day to day activities & use everyday examples, set little challenges for each other.
10. Little & Often is best - 10-15 minute study sessions, then a short break.
11. Make a plan & have goals - remember to include time for fun stuff too.
12. Plan a treat - something to look forward to after SATS.

Four Top Toys to Support Your Child's Talking

When it comes to boosting preschool and primary school age children's communication, you don't need flashy gadgets or complicated programmes. Often, the simplest toys create the richest language opportunities. Here are my top five toys for supporting speech, language and early communication skills at home.

1. Balloon-Powered Car Pump



Why it's brilliant: Cause-and-effect toys are gold for early communication. Children love watching the balloon inflate and the car zoom off. That predictable sequence builds attention, anticipation and interaction.

Supports: Early requesting (more, again, go), turn-taking, joint attention, action words (blow, pump, go, stop).

How to use it: Use simple, repetitive phrases: "Ready... steady... GO!" Pause after "ready... steady..." to give your child space to copy or anticipate. Model "more?" each time they want another turn.

2. Wooden Vehicle Puzzle



Why it's brilliant: Puzzles create natural chances for pointing, naming, matching and understanding everyday words. Vehicles are especially motivating for many young children.

Supports: Vocabulary (car, bus, ambulance, fire engine), understanding simple instructions, prepositions (in, out, on), sound imitation (nee-nah, beep, brum).

How to use it: Label each piece as you lift it out: "Car out!" Give clues: "Find the one that goes nee-nah." Offer choices so your child can communicate even if they're not yet speaking.

3. First 100 Words Book



Why it's brilliant: Books with real pictures support vocabulary, early categorisation and word-to-picture association. They're ideal for all early communicators, including those who prefer visual learning.

Supports: Everyday vocabulary, pointing and joint attention, early commenting, building understanding of categories (animals, transport, food).

How to use it: Avoid quizzing - simply comment, point and model: "Look, banana... yellow banana." Follow your child's lead and stay on their favourite pages longer.

4. Car Ramp Run



Why it's brilliant: Repetition is a key ingredient for learning language. Car ramps offer the same predictable action again and again, helping children practise the same sounds and words with joy, not pressure.

Supports: Early words (go, stop, fast, more), turn-taking, listening, predictive language ("again!" "my turn!")

How to use it: Take turns sending the car down the ramp. Before each turn, pause and wait - the pause encourages children to vocalise or gesture.

5 great and easy ways to use leftover food

3. Create wraps, sandwiches, or quesadillas

Use leftover meat, veggies, or beans with cheese or sauces for quick lunches.

4. Freeze for later meals

Portion leftovers into freezer-safe containers and label them for busy days.

5. Transform them into breakfast

Add leftovers to omelettes, frittatas, or breakfast burritos for a savoury start to the day.

Chocolate Hot Cross Buns

INGREDIENTS

- 450g Allinson Strong White Bread Flour
- 2 tbsp Cocoa Powder
- 1 tsp Salt
- 1 tsp Mixed Spice
- 3 tsp Allinson Easy Bake Yeast
- 75g Billington's Unrefined Golden Caster Sugar
- 80g Butter (Unsalted) (Room Temperature)

- 1 Egg
- 200ml Milk (Whole, Warm)
- 100g Milk Chocolate (Roughly Chopped)
- 50g Mixed Peel (Chopped)
- 80g Raisins

FOR THE CROSSES AND GLAZE

- 30g Plain White Flour
- 2 tbsp Apricot Glaze



UTENSILS

- Mixing Bowl
- Food Processor
- Butter Knife
- Cling Film
- Baking Sheet
- Food Bag
- Pastry Brush

METHOD

1. Sift the flour, cocoa, salt and mixed spice into a bowl, then stir in the yeast and caster sugar.
2. Rub the butter into the flour mixture until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs, this can be done in a food processor.
3. Mix the egg with the milk and gradually stir into the flour mixture using a butter knife until a soft dough is formed. Add only enough liquid, you may not need it all.
4. Put the dough on a lightly floured surface and knead for 10 minutes (this can be done in a mixer with a dough hook on a medium speed for 4-5 minutes), until the dough is smooth and silky.
5. Place in a large lightly oiled bowl and cover with cling film and leave to rise to at least double in size, about 1-2 hours.
6. Tip the dough out onto a floured surface and knead in chopped chocolate (not the whole rectangles), mixed peel, and raisins until evenly distributed.

7. Divide into 12 equal pieces, place a rectangle of plain chocolate in the middle of each piece of dough and then shape each one into a round bun so the chocolate rectangle is in the middle. Place in rows (3x4) on a lined baking sheet, leaving about 1cm between each.
8. Cover the dough with oiled cling film and leave to rise for another hour or until doubled in size and touching each other.
9. Preheat the oven 220°C (fan 200°C, gas mark 7). Mix the plain flour with 3 tablespoons of cold water to a paste and fill a food bag, snip the corner ever so slightly (or use a piping bag with a small plain nozzle) and use as a piping bag to pipe crosses onto the buns by going all the way along the middle of the buns in both directions.
10. Bake in the oven for 13-15 minutes until risen, turning the baking sheet if browning on one side too much.
11. Warm the apricot glaze and brush all over the buns as soon as they come out of the oven. Cool for 10 minutes before serving with butter if desired. Hot Cross Buns are undeniably a classic Easter bake, as is Chocolate, so why not combined two classics together to make the ultimate Chocolate Hot Cross Bun.

Big News, Little Ears: Helping Children Make Sense



of the News...

As parents, it is natural to want to protect our children from distressing events in the news. Seeing them upset can feel overwhelming, and it is understandable to avoid difficult conversations out of concern that talking might lead to more anxieties. However, open and supportive discussions can help children feel safe and reassured, reminding them that they do not have to carry their worries alone and that it is okay to ask questions or feel upset.

Even when children do not fully understand events, they are often aware that something troubling is happening. Without guidance, they may imagine scenarios that are more frightening or confusing.

Discuss your child's concerns openly rather than saying 'there's nothing to worry about'. Feeling worried at times is normal, keep talking and offer reassurance. We might be tempted to 'fix' our children's worries, but support comes from validating emotions and exploring together how we can understand our worries.

Use age-appropriate language. Young children benefit from short, clear explanations, while older children and teenagers may want more detail and discussion. Be mindful of exposure to news and social media, particularly repeated or graphic coverage.

Talk about helpers, such as emergency workers, doctors, teachers, community members, as this can offer reassurance that even in difficult situations, adults are working to keep others safe. These discussions do not need to answer every question; they simply help children feel heard, supported, and not alone.

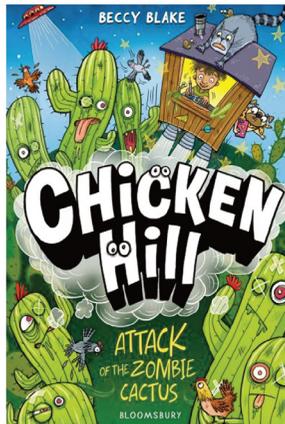
Chicken Hill - Attack of the Zombie Cactus by Becca Blake
